Writing Celebrations Outside and Online

Haldane Elementary School hosts virtual author visits and publishing parties to celebrate their work

Across the elementary school, our scholars have been furiously writing. Kindergarteners recently shared their writing focused on labeling key parts of their classrooms and illustrating their favorite places, including the zoo, movie theater, and pizza shop.

First grade writing celebrations (pictured right) allowed students to share their small moment stories. Students wrote about events such as apple picking, catching a frog, and boogie boarding. They then brought their moments to life by unfreezing their characters to make them move, talk, think, and feel using ellipses, pop out words, and exact actions.

Our second graders are developing a whole series of books with recurring central characters and supporting characters. Nonfiction stories are being created in third grade with topics that include real events and informational text about many topics, including Minecraft and Roblox.

The fourth graders worked to develop interesting leads, dialogue, and detailed scenes for their stories. Fifth graders held an outdoor writing celebration to share stories that centered around problems such as broken arms, shark attacks, and everything in between.

Each grade level participated in virtual visits with published authors, including Colleen AF Venable, author of The Oboe Goes Boom Boom Boom (Grades K-3), and Michael Buckley, author of Finn and the Intergalactic Lunch Box (Grades 4-8).

Throughout campus, Haldane elementary students are expanding on their writing abilities and learning the ropes as real authors.

The celebrations created empowering moments for all writers to share their work.
